TANYA TAYLOR HAS DESIGNED ONLY three collections, but her clothes feel like the work of a veteran: boxy tailored jackets, '60s-inspired tunics and covetable cut-out dresses that successfully straddle the line between playful and sophisticated. The Toronto-born, New York-based designer graduated from Parsons and honed her skills at the Olsen twins' label Elizabeth and James before launching her own brand in 2011. Since then, celebs like Rashida Jones have sported her quirky-femme looks. The corals and florals of her spring 2013 collection, inspired by the posh Sandy Lane resort in Barbados, earned her raves from online fashion bible Style.com—the kind of attention established designers would kill for.
